CLANCY TO THE RESCUE

Divide the group into seven smaller groups and assign each group one of the words listed below. Read the story. After each of the words is read pause for the group to make the appropriate response.

CLANCY	(feel your muscles, like a strong man)
HORSES	(Slap thighs)
YELL	(Indian fashion, with hand over mouth)
FIRE ENGINE	(High-pitched siren sound)
BELL	(Swing arm like a clapper saying, *Clang, clang, clang!')
HOSE	(Shh-sh-sh sound like water from a hose)
STEAM	(Hissing s-s-s-s sound)

If you like <u>HORSES</u>, you would have enjoyed living back in the 1800's when they had old-fashioned <u>STEAM</u> type <u>FIRE ENGINES</u>, pulled by <u>HORSES</u>. One of the <u>FIRE ENGINES</u> was driven by the greatest hero ever, <u>CLANCY</u>! Yes, Sir! <u>CLANCY</u> was a real hero. Every day when there was no fire, he would take the <u>HORSES</u> out for exercise, trotting them gently up and down the streets. If there were children along the way, <u>CLANCY</u> would always stop and let them pet the <u>HORSES</u>.

Sometimes the alarms were in the daytime, but sometimes they were at night.
